

I'm so grateful that my mom was able to come to Northern California, where my wife, Meaghan, and I live, to visit for a couple weeks.We had so much fun as a family – eating at the Japanese restaurant nearby, taking Mom shopping (her favorite leisure activity), and playing with our dog, Boaz, who at 70 lbs. is almost as big as my mom.

I appreciate that even though my mom came to California for a vacation, she's always ministry-minded, too. She asked me and Meaghan to travel with her to Southern California for a few days, particularly to minister at the church of Greg and Kennis Bishop. The Bishops are long-time friends (Kennis' parents are Harriet and Kenny Furuya, who organized our Southern California concert tours for many years) and are now serving at Grace Covenant Church in San Diego. The Bishops have a thriving ministry, with an English-language service on Sunday mornings and a Spanish-language service in the afternoon.

Mom and I led worship at the morning service, and when Pastor Greg introduced us, he made sure to tell a funny story about my father. He said that when he and Kennis went on their honeymoon to the Big Island, they were in their hotel room and heard a knock on their door. Who could it be, they wondered, on our honeymoon? Well, there at the door was Randy, my dad. He was there to give them a tour of the Big Island. He grew up there, so who better to be their tour guide? Pastor Greg said that only Randy could do something like that – crash a young couple's honeymoon and get away with it – because he was so full of aloha.

When I had a chance to share in that morning service, I had to tell a story of my own about Kennis and Greg. I shared that I remembered their wedding, now decades ago, and how Greg planned something I'd never seen before, and haven't seen since. As Kennis was walking down the aisle, a recording played of Greg reading his journal. He said something like, "My mom always told me that the woman I marry should be someone who lights up a room when she walks into it. I want to be in rooms that Kennis walks into for the rest of my life." I shared how I remembered thinking, "Wow, I want to meet a woman who makes me want to be in rooms she walks into for the rest of my life, too!" And eventually, in God's perfect time, I did. Meaghan lights up any room, and she lights up my life.

It was such a privilege to be able to share our songs and testimonies and to usher in the Spirit of God as we led in worship. It was also a blessing to see Kennis and Greg ministering so powerfully in their gifting, exactly where God ordained them to be. Although we hadn't planned it initially, we ended up staying for part of the afternoon Spanish-language service as well. I shared (through Greg's translation since he's fluent in Spanish) that when missionaries first came to Hawai'i, they found one of the best ways to share the Gospel was through music – and an example of this was Kanaka Waiwai, a Hawaiian-language song that tells the story of the Rich Young Ruler from the Gospel of Mark. The congregation enjoyed seeing how we worship God in our Hawaiian culture, just as we were moved to hear their songs of praises in Spanish. It was a reminder of how even now, we anticipate that Great Worship Service that will take place in heaven:

There before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." Revelation 7:9-10

I am so thankful for Taylor's servant heart – always willing to jump in and help wherever needed, always for the Lord's glory.

Our overseas ministry has come to a halt because of the pandemic, but we trust in the words of Ecclesiastes 3:11: "He has made everything beautiful in

His time." We trust that in His time, God will allow Covid travel restrictions to be lifted so we can continue our missions work. Andrew, Meaghan, and I are planning to go to Japan to minister with the Pagaragans in their outreach to students at The Neighborhood Sunrise Cafe. We will be doing a Hawaiian concert with music and dance to share our culture and, most importantly, our love for Jesus Christ. In the past we have had much success presenting evangelistic concerts in large venues in hopes of attracting non-Christians to hear Hawaiian music. This time the venue for our concert might be different because of Covid restrictions, but we will minister wherever the Lord opens opportunities. Andrew and Meaghan will continue on to Southeast Asia to do ministry projects in documentary film and medical outreach.

The Lord has allowed us to continue our ministry here in Hawaii and California through small gatherings, sociallydistanced worship services, and online concerts. In 2017, Andrew won an Emmy Award as part of a team with NBC News. God is now using this gifted journalist to produce videos for Christian Vision. I am blessed to be an 'ohana leader for the Women's Fellowship at Kalihi Union Church. Each week we meet to study God's Word, learn from each other, and grow as prayer warriors. Of course, there have been challenges meeting during this pandemic – but we've overcome them with the help of Taylor Pagaragan and Sarah Williams, who help with the technical part. (Some of our members attend in-person, and some on Zoom).

Recently, our women's group had the wonderful opportunity to minister to a missionary family who was visiting Honolulu, Jackson and Anneke Ndecheck and their children. Jackson is originally from Cameroon and does missionary work in Africa, and Anneke is originally from Norway and now is the personal secretary to Loren Cunningham, the founder of Youth With a Mission, in Kona. The Ndechecks were staying at Kalihi Union Church's guesthouse so that Anneke, who was having a complicated pregnancy, could receive the medical care she needed. I led the women's fellowship in providing all the things the Ndechecks needed so they could have a comfortable stay: cleaning the guest house for them, stocking the fridge with groceries, and watching the children so that Jackson and Anneke could minister to the congregation.

I told Anneke that I was a missionary with my husband for more than 40 years, so I know how exhausting it can be delivering a sermon and then ministering to the people. All those years I helped Randy prepared me to help Anneke and Jackson.

We're happy to report that Anneke safely delivered their fifth baby here in Honolulu, whom they named Miracle!
