People ask me, "How do you like living in Modesto?" My answer: "I love it!"

I have kept my apartment in Hawaii. The mortgage was paid off three months after Randy's passing with the help of Christian Vision. Chey Sanders (who is the sister of Matt Sanders, who is husband of my niece, Cheryl Toma Sanders) has been my housemate ever since she moved to Hawai'i from Texas to direct the play "Glory in His Soul" in 2018. Chey is looking after my apartment. So I have a place to stay whenever I go to Hawai'i.

In May, I went on a cruise from Montreal to Eastern Canada ending in Boston. I was invited by my sister Joy who often travels with her high school classmates. After the cruise we had planned to visit Andrew in California for two weeks. As God would have it, Joy and I were in California when baby Paul was born. I returned to Hawai'i after that, then made my permanent move to Modesto on September 18. Andrew and Meaghan went back to work then, and I was the sole babysitter.

My first day as babysitter started with a desperate prayer: "Lord Jesus, help me!" Generally Paul is mellow and a joy to care for. However once in a while, when he is hungry and sleepy and I am slow in warming his bottle, he throws a fit. Then by the time I give him his bottle. he is sobbing uncontrollably and is too upset to drink. So I carry him and sing songs like "Jesus, What a Wonder You Are" (with much prayer) and amazingly he calms down and is able to nurse his bottle. Now I have learned to anticipate and get the bottle ready before he gets too upset. It is a good thing I live with my son's family, because I can't live a day without Paul's smile and laughter. Every day, every moment I have with my precious grandson is a gift from God.

- 2. My church denomination. I was with Kalihi Union Church, which is an Evangelical Free Church, for more than 50 years.

Now I go to St. Matthias Church in Oakdale, California, which is part of the Anglican Church of North America. Although it is very different in the style of worship, the teaching is Biblical and the theology is conservative. I love Pastor John Roberts who is a very good friend as well as a spiritual leader.

So many changes and adjustments had to be made, but I am at peace knowing that God has prepared the way for me and His timing is always perfect. God is doing a new thing in my life. I am confident this is His will, and I am blessed to follow as He leads. Please pray God would sustain me through the cold winter here.

I am the fifth of six children, and my oldest sister was JoAnn Shinsato Kaneshiro. She is thirteen years older than I.

During World War II, JoAnn was in elementary school in Tokyo, Japan. The bombing was so severe that the students and their teachers were sent to live in the countryside of Toyama. During that time God miraculously protected JoAnn so that she was not consumed by the bombing. She also survived despite starvation and sickness. This is why JoAnn loved the scripture verse above from Lamentations 3.

She was 14 years old when she moved to Hawaii. JoAnn received Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior when I invited her to attend the Japanese services at Kalihi Union Church. She was a very dedicated and active member and because she was bilingual, she served on the council of elders representing the Japanese Fellowship.

JoAnn was a hairdresser and married to her beloved husband, Wallace "Gitcho" Kaneshiro. Together they had four sons and nine grandchildren. My childhood and formative years were so much richer because of her presence in my life. She cut my hair and gave me perms and did my hair for me every morning when I was in elementary school. She sewed beautiful dresses for me. The best birthday present I ever got was a ruby ring that she wrapped in an egg carton. She was God's gift to me in supporting and encouraging me in everything I did. She loved and

appreciated Randy for his musical and spiritual guidance while serving at KUC. She was kind and generous and supported Christian Vision. Her last days were filled with thanksgiving, joy, and anticipation of entering her heavenly home and seeing her beloved Jesus.

My Advent Discipline By Andrew Hongo



December is the season of Advent, when we look towards Jesus' birth and prepare our hearts for His arrival. I love Advent; I try to keep my heart open to Him all through the year, but there's something special about having a particular season to make that our priority. One discipline I'm implementing this Advent is lectio divina, an ancient practice of meditating on a short portion of Scripture and listening to what God is saying through His word. I use an app called "Ritual" that leads me through the various steps of lectio divina: "lectio," listening to the reading of God's word; "meditatio," meditating on what God is saying to us through that passage; "oratio," in which we raise up a prayer to God in response; and "contemplatio," entering stillness and silence in contemplation before God. During Advent, we are focusing on passages leading up to the birth of esus.

I do my lectio divina in our backyard each morning with Paul, our son, and Bobo, our dog. I strap my son to my chest in a wrap, drape a big blanket over both of us to keep us warm, and sit on a purple exercise ball. (Paul loves to bounce up and down, and the exercise ball good for my back, too!) Bobo comes outside with us, since he loves the chilly Northern California weather.

Before beginning my lectio divina, I take a few minutes to center and still myself in God's presence. I appreciate the beauty of God's creation in our backyard: the green leaves fluttering in the breeze, the pink blossoms of the crepe myrtle, the bright blue of sky and the bracing chill of morning air. I feel my son warm against my chest, and look at his adorable face,

his deep brown eyes, and I realize he may be the most beautiful thing God has created. And sometimes Bobo interrupts this reverie by bringing me one of his toys to play tug of war.

Then I begin the process of lectio divina. A recent reading was from Luke 1:17-20, in which the angel Gabriel tells Zechariah that he and his wife will have a son, John. Zechariah asks the angel how this will be possible, given his and his wife's old age, and the angel replies: "But now you will be speechless and unable to talk until the day these things take place, because you did not believe my words, which will be fulfilled at their proper time."

What jumped out to me was the phrase "fulfilled at their proper time." For Zechariah, this meant that yes, he and his wife were well-advanced in years, but that God could do anything, in His perfect time. I thought about how Zechariah and his wife had probably wanted children long before this, how they had possibly experienced years of heartbreak and sadness. But now, the time had come for the fulfillment of this long-cherished dream.

I meditated on how this applies to my own life. For much of my 30s I remained single - unhappily single. I had watched most of my high-school and college friends fall in love, get married, buy houses, and start families, and in my aloneness and loneliness, I would ask the Lord, "When is it my turn? Can't You hurry up and get me a wife?" Finally, at age 37, I met Meaghan at a church Bible study, and from our first date, believed she was the one God had chosen for me. She is II years younger than I am, and we realized that if we met when I had wanted to get married, say when I was 28 years old, she would have been 17 years old – an inappropriate age gap. But God allowed us to get married at the proper time, when I was 39 and she was 28. Every day I see that God chose exactly the woman I needed, and every day I fall more and more in love with her. As Ecclesiastes 3:11 says, "He hath made everything beautiful in its time" - including my becoming a father at 44 years young.

Then, as the "oratio" step, I lifted up a prayer to the Lord. I thanked God for His perfect timing in bringing me a wife, and our son, and I asked Him to help me trust Him for the things I am still waiting for. And finally, as the "contemplatio" step, I just sat in silence in our backyard, enjoying the peace of the morning, the warmth of my son, and Bobo's slobber on my leg. I heard the Lord telling me, "Son, it is a joy to give you all good things in My perfect time. Thank you for being patient and trusting in Me."
